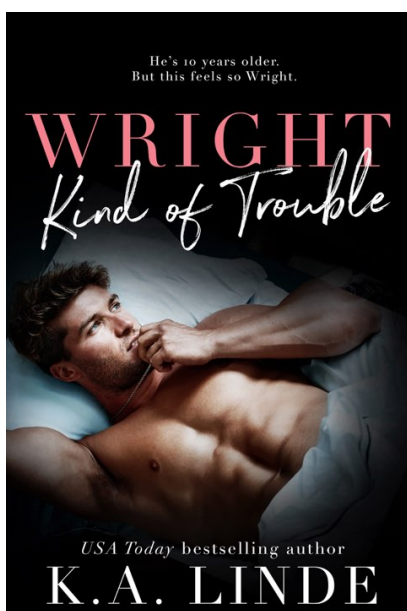
My heart hammered in my chest. I wanted that. Fuck, I wanted it.
