

People suck. Well, people have always sucked, but they suck times ten


thousand right now.


He collects himself. "Do you like it here?"

"You didn't tell me his sister is Maya Slade! She's YouTube famous. I


watched her vlog last year when I was manifesting a trip to Switzerland."

"Because I'd rather see you smile than cry."



I cover up my dark thoughts with an eye roll. "No. Men like me aren't shy."


She pokes my chest before dragging her finger down the muscles of my stomach. "You totally are. Tell me, why do you like sniffing my hair?"

"Why not?"


"Because music is food for the soul, and mine feels like it's missing."

"You should consider making more time for your hobby."


"Why?"



Okay, that was *so* not what I practiced saying in front of the mirror this morning.


"Yes, *bambina*?" Color drains from his cheeks.
