I welcome discussing something besides my crazy. I've been genuinely concerned about Iris's pregnancy.

"Everything okay, Bo?" I ask, keeping my voice deliberately even and *un*concerned.

"Yeah, completely. The doctor says my pregnancy is boringly normal. This is a routine visit."

"September will be here before you know it."

"And I can't wait. August is obsessed with the baby."

"Of course he is." August is one of the good ones. One of the few men I would trust with my cousin and her daughter Sarai.

"He told me Kenan asked for your number." Iris lets the comment hang over the airwaves.

"Hmmmm," I reply, finding a small smile despite the anxiety whirring in my belly. "So that's how he got it."

"Well did he call?" Iris demands, excitement and hope all up in her voice.

"You and August are such matchmakers," I say, avoiding her question. One question will lead to another, and eventually she'll realize I've seen Kenan a few times and we've been . . . conversant. Hell, we've been kissversant.

"Did. He. Call?" Iris persists.

"Text," I reply, giving her just the tip of what she wants. "He invited me to the Rucker on Saturday."

"You could tell me a little about yourself. A little bit of your story?" She pauses. "Or I could tell you a little of mine. It took me a long time to speak out, but now I do all the time. At first it was to help myself. Now it's to help other people."

Her words carry a warning—an urging to choose *deal* instead of *don't*.

I remember huddling in Chase's shower sobbing after perfectly good sex. I see my body curled into a ball, fetal, at the base of a hand-drawn tree in my closet. I smell the hair burning, the smoke curling around my memories. My peace of mind, up in flames.

Are you leaking, Lo?

Drip. Drip. Drip.

"I don't know why now," I say, sudden and without any context, but she seems to understand. "I've been fine. For years, I've been fine."

"I was fine, too," she says. "I'm Marsha, by the way."

"Lotus," I offer.

"Nice to meet you, Lotus. I'm a survivor, but also a licensed therapist. I run this support group for survivors of childhood sexual abuse," she says. "So what brought you here tonight?"

"I've been having some, uh . . . issues with sex. Things I've never dealt with before."

"That's not surprising. It's where the injury took place, so for many of us,

for most of us, our sexuality is affected. It is the thing that was deeply violated."

"I thought I'd escaped all that. I've had sex for years and been okay. I mean, I put sex in a category, but I enjoyed it."

I hesitate. We're talking, but I still feel like I could make my escape if I need to. Sitting down indicates we might be here for a while. And I'm not sure I want to be here much longer, but I grab a water and sit down. When I take the seat, Marsha smiles, but does a decent job hiding her satisfaction.

"So sex was for your pleasure," Marsha says, picking up where I left off. "Sounds good so far."

"It was." I laugh, but it holds no real humor. "I know a lot of survivors have trouble with sex, but I've always enjoyed it."

"Good for you, and yes. You're right. I, for example, didn't have my first orgasm until I was thirty-three."

My mouth is hanging open, and I know it's rude and insensitive, but damn. I can't imagine. "Not even . . . touching yourself?"

"Masturbation was a big part of my recovery," she says, her eyes never wavering while she shares such sensitive information. "I couldn't experience pleasure with someone else's hand. I had to feel safe with my own first."

She tilts her head and winks. "Don't worry. With a lot of therapy, hard work, and a very patient partner, things are much better in that department now," she says. "A lot of relationships don't survive the recovery process because we need so much control, and our partners can't take it. Control related to our triggers, to the effects of our trauma. Sex requires a lot of trust. We forget how much sometimes—forget the magnitude of sharing ourselves that way."

"I never had trouble trusting someone else with my body," I say, frowning, wondering if something is wrong with me, with the way I processed everything. "But I could never trust them with anything else. No real . . . intimacy, I guess. I made sure they knew it was just sex. I've never

allowed myself to feel anything else, but lately, that hasn't been satisfying."

"Part of healthy sexuality is knowing you are loveable and worthy even if you *don't* offer yourself sexually," Marsha says. "There can't be real intimacy without some love or affection. If you blocked those completely, sex may have started to feel . . . transactional or purely a physical release."

Marsha offers a one-sided grin. "If we have some time together, I'm sure we can dig around and figure out what you've done to survive. That's all any of us do. We find ways to regain, or at least, to *feel* that we regain the control that was taken from us. We were helpless and are constantly looking for ways to make sure we're not in that position again. Some people become hypersexual. Some can't have sex at all."

"I decided to take a break from sex," I say. "and I haven't really missed it." Kenan's face, his voice, his scent all invade my imagination, my memory.

"That's common, too," Marsha says, nodding. "It's not unusual at all to have a season of celibacy while you sort things out. It sounds like you've been listening to yourself closely, and your instincts are guiding you well."

I am more self-aware than many. I know that is a result of how MiMi raised me—how she taught me to tune into things I can't see with my natural eyes. Even my own pain.

"It's fine if sex is sometimes just a release," Marsha continues. "Many survivors have sex, but detach emotionally because such an early sexual experience was associated with abandonment or some trauma. Detaching emotionally is a protective measure. It could be a defense mechanism because you're afraid to trust someone with much else, especially if you've been betrayed by someone you should have been able to trust, like a family member or . . . whomever."

I weigh my next words. They're queued up on my tongue, and sit there so long I'm not sure I'll ever be able to push them out.

"It was my mom's boyfriend," I force myself to say.

"I'm sorry, Lotus," she says so kindly.

"Yeah. Um, thanks."

That's all I want to say for now. I think I'm hitting a wall, and having said it out loud, I don't want to be in the same room as those words. I stand and toss my half-full water bottle in the recycle bin.

"I'm gonna go," I say in a rush. "I need to . . . to go."

"Of course." Marsha stands and reaches for her purse, extracting a business card and offering it to me. "We meet every Thursday evening. Same bat time, same bat place, and my information is there if you ever want to talk some more."

I stare at the card for a few seconds before accepting it and looking up to find her eyes still on me. "Thanks."

I start back toward the steps and pause when a thought strikes me. "Marsha, can I ask you a question?"

"Anything," she says, and I can tell she means it.

"I guess when you're in a season like this, it's a bad time to start a relationship, huh?"

I can't even believe I asked, but what's happening between Kenan and me is becoming irresistible. When I finally do give in, I want to know how to cause as little damage as possible.

"It depends," Marsha says. "Sometimes we hold so tightly to the hurt from the past that we miss the happiness ahead, and if there is one thing we deserve, Lotus, it's happiness wherever we can find it."

The summer of my rookie season, I came to Harlem for the pro league tournament at Rucker Park, the most famous basketball court in the world. If you want street cred, you earn it here. It's your pilgrimage to Mecca.

On the surface, it's unassuming. There's no glamour to the outdoor court with two hoops and five rows of bleachers, but legends were made here. Dr. J got his *name* here before anyone really even knew who he was. The summer he played, people crowded the rooftop of the school across the street, climbed, and watched from trees, and pressed their noses to the fence for a glimpse of this kid who flew through the air with unparalleled grace, and rocked the rim with more force than they'd ever seen. It was the crowds at the Rucker who first chanted "Dr. J." They christened him, and it stuck. He played for Philadelphia, my hometown, and he changed the game. "How you liking New York, Glad?" Ben Mason, a point guard who came into the NBA the same year I did, asks. We're signing autographs back-to-back, encircled by a crowd of kids.

Really, Ben? Sure, why not chat about my most painful, humiliating experiences while signing autographs for a hundred screaming kids? Perfect timing.

"It's behind us now," I say aloud instead. "We're just trying to figure out how to co-parent my daughter well."

"You a better man than me," Ben continues. "If that had been me—"

"But it wasn't." I turn around to face him, not even trying to hide my irritation anymore.

"Sorry, Glad," Ben rushes to say. "Man, I'm tripping. I know that was a tough time. I didn't mean to bring it up."

"And yet you're *still* talking." I turn back around and resume signing items and taking photos with fans.

My frustration isn't actually about him, though. I'm disappointed Lotus didn't show. I hadn't admitted to myself how much I hoped she would. I did act like an asshole in the stairwell. I thought I fixed it, but maybe not.

"Over here, Glad!" a kid yells, holding up his phone to take a picture. When I look in his direction, a flash of color catches my eye. A small gap in the crowd reveals silk the color of butter spread on sun-toasted skin. A woman wears a backless yellow jumper that clings to her ass. What looks like an intricate zipper with tiny flowers instead of teeth is tattooed up her naked spine. "I'm a planner," I tell her, negotiating the Harlem streets. "I always have things mapped out, and I usually follow that course meticulously."

"Sounds like you don't leave much room for the unexpected," she says, turning slightly in her seat to study me while I'm driving.

"That might be true, but when I do, I know it's the right thing. That it's worth going off-road for. I told you I knew I was going to law school and one day, hoped to be a judge like my father. The NBA was the biggest re-route of my life, but I don't regret it."

Lotus is one of the most unexpected things I've encountered. The day she walked into that hospital room, I wasn't looking for anything with another woman. I was standing up to my neck in the mess Bridget had made of our lives, and was ready to put every woman in the booty-call category indefinitely. She seats us in an out-of-the-way booth, for which I'm appreciative. I'm not one of those guys who can't leave the house without being mobbed, but my height makes people look twice. And on that second look, many of them recognize me. I don't want a lot of attention on my first date with Lotus.

Is this a date?

Are we still just friends?

Was it ever simple?

I decide not to define it, but to just enjoy it. To enjoy her.

I stick to water and Lotus orders one of Sylvia's signature Bloody Marys with Ketel One and triple-strength hot sauce. She takes a sip and hisses. "Ahhh. That's got a kick."

"What are you getting?" I ask, scanning the menu for anything that fits my regimen. My options are pretty limited.

"I thought about the chicken and waffles, but I think I'll get shrimp and grits." She sets the menu down, her smile a little wistful. "Maybe I'm missing home."

"You ate that a lot in Louisiana?"

"Yeah. I've never tasted it better than MiMi's. And her étouffée was delicious, too. Really everything she cooked was the best."

"New Orleans is a fascinating place," I say, thinking this might be a good segue into the awkward question I need to ask.

"There's no place like it." She gives me a sudden grin. "You'd love all the jazz. Have you ever seen the second line?"

"Second line?"

"Like the funeral marches with the jazz bands?"

"On television or whatever. Not in real life."

"In voodoo, they celebrate after death to please the spirits who protect the dead." She stares at me as if waiting for something, and for a moment, I wonder if she already knows what I want to ask.

"Can I ask you something that might be a little . . ." I search for the right word, but for what I want to ask, I'm not sure there is one. ". . . awkward?"

"More awkward than kissing me for the first time in front of all my friends at a party?"

An unrepentant grin kicks up one side of my mouth. "About the same level of awkward."

"Oh, okay. Then go for it."

I reach across the table and take her hand. Her glance bounces from our linked hands to my face and back again.

"MiMi was the most important person in my life," she says, her voice stiff and starched. "I won't expose her to mockery. I want to keep liking you, and I'm not sure I could if you thought of her as foolish or said the wrong thing."

"Hey." I put my hand over hers. "I don't mean to insult your great-grandmother, or your mother, or—"

"MiMi was the last. My mother didn't practice." She looks away and toward the door. "Neither did her sister, Iris's mother. Neither did our grandmother." Her lips thin and twist with cynicism. "Now *they* were the ones who really knew how to cast a spell on a man."

I want to ask, to probe, but Lotus said before there were things she didn't want to share yet.

"I just need to know you're not making dolls of me and sticking needles in them or something," I say to lighten the atmosphere.

A smile dispels her sober expression. "I save the dolls for the really bad guys."

"I'm not sure if I should laugh, feel reassured, or run for the hills."

"There's the door." She tilts her head toward the entrance. "If you want to

run."

I drag a glance over her wild hair, and sultry eyes, the high, full breasts straining against the sunshine silk, and the lips that beg to be kissed.

"I'll take my chances," I finally reply.

She doesn't answer, but the knowing look she gives me all but says *that's* what *I* thought. The server brings our food, giving me the chance to shift the topic to less dangerous ground.

"That looks good." I point my fork at her shrimp and grits.

"So does yours."

I ordered a veggie plate of black-eyed peas, collard greens, and macaroni and cheese.

"I thought you'd like it, and Sylvia's is one of those things you should do when you're in Harlem."

"I'll have to take you around Brooklyn some time. You can never do everything in New York. And summers here are my favorite."

"I'd love to see Brooklyn. I have to go to Philly next week to check on some business interests. Maybe when I get back?"

"Maybe. I wouldn't want you to think I'm trying to change the conditions of our . . ." The look she sends me is half-teasing, half-earnest. ". . . friendship."

"Friends do things together."

"Mmmm," is her only answer, accompanied by a smile. "So what's so special about the Rucker?"

I go with *her* change to a safer subject.

"It's a proving ground," I answer. "All the greats go there at some point, some of them playing against local guys who never made it to the NBA, but are as talented as the professionals. If making it was purely based on talent, I certainly wouldn't be in the NBA. It's hard work. Staying out of trouble. Understanding the system and working inside of it."

"Who are some of your favorite players?"

"The Big O, for sure."

"I'm a fan of the Big O myself," she says with a straight face and teasing eyes.

It takes me a second to put that together, and visions of Lotus mid-orgasm make me choke on my black-eyed peas.

"Very funny," I say, coughing and sipping my water. "But I meant the *other* Big O, as in Oscar Robertson, the first NBA player to average a triple double."

"I'm sure he's great, too." She shrugs, and that damn strap falls away from her shoulder.

who hurt them. I know how far it went. I know how it affects each of them to this day.

Sherrie's uncle started touching her when she was only four years old, and it wasn't discovered until she was eight. He was never allowed to be alone with her again, but no charges were brought against him. He never spent a day in jail. She got no real help, and it wasn't until she was battling depression and had attempted suicide that a therapist unearthed what was really beneath it all.

It was Chloe's cousin.

It was Kyla's aunt.

I may not know where they live, or their favorite TV show, but I'm intimate with their pain, and I sit in a circle of light where they expose their darkest secrets.

Kenan doesn't know about my Thursday nights. The last few weeks have been magical in so many ways, with our relationship growing, deepening, at the perfect pace. We've had relatively little time together because of my schedule and his. He's had to travel overseas for a few commitments and appearances, and my life is confined to the atelier. But when we are together, it's like nothing I've ever felt before, and more fun than I've ever had. Exploring the Brooklyn Museum, Coney Island fireworks on Fridays, Saturdays at Smorgasburg, Brooklyn's food flea market in Prospect Park, ferry rides, music festivals, and Shakespeare in the Park. "He's so sweet," Kyla says, her smile coming and then going. "He tried to kiss me, and I froze. It wasn't as bad as it's been before when I . . . fought, but I still froze."

A single tear skids over her cheek, and she swipes at it impatiently. "I just want to kiss someone nice, someone good, without thinking about what *she* did to me." Kyla swallows and closes her eyes. "I'd forgotten for so long. I wish it had stayed buried and I'd never remembered."

"Our minds don't usually let us get away with that forever," Marsha says. "And even if we don't remember, it will find a way to manifest. At least when you remember, we know what we're dealing with. We know *how* to deal with it."

"He was really sweet about it," Kyla adds with a smile. "We're going out again."

"We're fine," she rushes to reassure me. "I'm sorry. I didn't mean to . . . we're fine."

There's a hesitation, a pause before she resumes.

"My mom called," she says.

"Aunt Priscilla?" A frown knots my eyebrows. "What'd she want?"

"She didn't have your number."

"Neither of them do. Why would they?"

"She was calling to let us know your mom's in the hospital, Lo," she says. "Mama says you need to go home."

Home is not New Orleans.

And home certainly isn't anywhere near May DuPree, the woman who abandoned me thirteen years ago for a piece of shit named Ron Clemmons.

I haven't called Aunt Priscilla back. I don't know if I will. Iris's relationship with her mother isn't quite as bad as mine, but it's not much better. It was a coincidence Aunt Pris called the day her new grandson was born. Iris hadn't shared any of the details of her pregnancy with her. They have their own drama.

I've chosen to have no contact with my mother, and don't see any reason to change that. Iris thinks if it's as serious as Aunt Pris says, I may want to try making some kind of peace before it's too late.

It's taken me years to be as healthy as I am now. What if seeing my mother, revisiting that place and that time, sets me back? What if all the ground I've gained over the summer, I lose chasing some idealized peace that seeing a dying woman won't actually give?

My mother gave birth. Whoop-de-do. Cats and dogs give birth to entire litters. There is no miracle to birth, from what I've seen. The miracle is what follows. The miracle of selflessness. The phenomenon of nurturing self-worth and sacrificing for a child—feeding not just their bodies, but their souls. Oh, I know what a mother is, and it is not May DuPree. I had a mother. When I was dead inside, a walking, catatonic open wound of a child who refused to even speak, MiMi gave me *life*.

That's a mother, and mine is already dead.

"You have to do what's right for you," Marsha tells me over the phone.

"Yeah, but what should I *do*?" I ask. "How am I supposed to know what's right for me?"

"I think—"

"Yes," I cut in. "Please tell me what you think. I don't need your professional distance, Marsha."

"I'm your friend and a professional," she reminds me. "I think if you go,

you need to know why you're going and manage your expectations. What would you want from her? For her?"

"I don't want anything for her," I spit, shifting to bring my legs under me on Kenan's couch. "She was basically dead to me anyway. We haven't spoken since the day she gave me away."

"Okay, that's fair. Then what would you want *from* her? For yourself?"

I think about that for a moment and ask honestly what I'd want from her if we were in the same room.

"I'd want the words—for her to tell me," I answer in a rush of indignation and long-corked rage. "Why'd she give me away? How could she choose him over me?"

My chest rises and falls with heaving breaths, like I've been running.

"But what could she say that would make it better, Lotus?" Marsha asks. "What could she possibly say that wouldn't sound like a pitiful excuse?"

Nothing. There's nothing she could say to make it right, and anything she came up with would feel like an insult.

"So why go?" I ask, shrugging, feeling helpless and furious, like something is boiling in my belly with a tight lid. Like I could blow at any moment.

"What if the words you need aren't *from* her," Masha says, "but *to* her?"

"You want me to forgive her?" I ask, choking on the concept.

"Not necessarily. If you can, great, but if you can't, not forgiving someone else doesn't mean you can't heal. I don't agree when people say a survivor can't really move on until they forgive the people who hurt them. The key, from my perspective, is releasing the hurt. Moving on in your life without the hurt holding you back. Maybe it's not words you need to hear from her, but words you need to say to her that will help you in this situation. If you think that could be the case, then that's why you go. Not expecting anything she could ever say to make you feel better about the inexcusable thing she did."

Her words land with the thud of truth in my belly where MiMi used to say your "knower" lives. Your gut.

For a long time after Marsha and I hang up, I sit there on Kenan's couch and wonder what I would say to her. Marsha suggested I write it down, but I'm not sure I know where to start.

Kenan comes in from practice and drops his gym bag on the floor, watching me with a concerned frown. He walks over, flops onto the couch,

and pulls me on his lap. I burrow into the clean smell of his neck.

"Aw man. You showered," I say, affecting disappointment. "I was hoping to lick the sweat off your body."

"I could go back and sweat again," he offers hopefully.

"Maybe next time." I kiss his jaw and twine our fingers, enjoying him, his silence for a few moments. "I'm going to New Orleans."

He stiffens under me, pulling back to peer into my face. "You are?" he asks. "You sure?"

"Yeah."

"Damn the timing," he grumbles. "If I didn't have to go to China for this exhibition game, I'd go with you."

"I'll be fine."

"And with the new baby, Iris can't go," he goes on, like he's turning it over in his head, searching for a solution. "Maybe Billie or Yari?"

"I'll be fine by myself. Really."

"Call me." He presses his lips into my hair. "I want to be there for you however I can."

I nod against his chest and wrap my arms around the broad torso.

"Can I ask you something?" I ask after a moment of us wrapped up in each other.

"Anything."

"Well, you have this reputation for being kind of surly."

He chuckles. "How do you know that? Remember you don't even follow basketball."

"It doesn't take much digging. And I didn't google you. My friends were very quick to tell me all about how intimidating you are. How you don't talk much to the press. How everyone thinks you're all hard and enigmatic."

"Okay, your point?"

"You've never been any of that with me, Kenan." I glance up. "From the start, you were open and curious about me, and you told me things and—"

"I wanted you," he interrupts. "I hadn't ever wanted anything or anyone the way I wanted you almost from the beginning. I saw you in that hospital room, and that was it. I'm not saying I fell in love that day, but you wouldn't leave me alone."

He's quiet for a beat and then glances at me, a flicker of uncertainty foreign on his strong features.

"You didn't feel anything that first day we met?" he asks. "Or at that

awards show? At the Christmas party last year? Any of the times we ran into each other?" He gives a quick shake of his head. "It doesn't matter. You feel it now."

I take his chin between my fingers and direct his eyes to meet mine. "You're asking if all the times I fled the room as soon as possible, all the times I pretended you weren't there or was a smartass to put you off, if I was feeling anything?"

He lowers his face until our noses touch.

"I told you before you scared me to death," I confess, licking my lips. "I should still be scared. Love is hard. Trust is hard."

"Well I have no choice now," he says, kissing one of my cheeks and then the other. "You have something of mine that I'm not sure I'll ever get back."

"Oh, yeah?" I ask huskily. "And what do I have of yours, Mr. Ross?" He tells me in the way he knows melts me into a puddle—with a song.

"You have stolen my heart with one look of your eyes."

In the hospital room, I search for my mother through the tangle of wires and tubes. She's unconscious, giving me time to study her without the awkwardness of what I should say. Of what she could *possibly* say to me.

"You came."

Aunt Priscilla's voice is a mix of sweet tea and Sazerac, the French Quarter cocktail; an old Haitian family recipe of bitters, Cognac, absinthe, and the peel of a lemon. That's the bitter edge Aunt Pris's voice carries from scratching out her living in the Lower Ninth. With Aunt Pris, you gotta take the bitter with the sweet.

I don't know how she does it, but Aunt Pris never ages. She looks like Iris's slightly older sister, not her mother. A shade darker than Iris and a few shades lighter than I am, she is more beautiful than us both. Her hair hangs in a fluent wave to her waist, and her eyes, still unlined, could make a man jump from a cliff to get to her. I've seen it happen, figuratively at least. Men who left their wives, abandoned their kids, lost their jobs for a taste of Aunt Priscilla. She, however, was wiser than my mother, and never developed a taste for *them*. She never got caught up on one particular man—never gave herself so fully to one lover that she would excuse his sins against her own flesh and blood. That she would turn her back on her daughter with no regret. No, she committed different sins, and those are for her and Iris to sort. I'm here to deal with my own demons.

"Yeah. I came," I reply.

"Thank you."

Her voice actually trembles, and when I look at the ageless beauty, I see real vulnerability, real fear. Seeing anything sincere on her face is new to me. She and my mother knew all about armor—about shiny façades to draw a man close enough to pay, but to keep him at arm's length so he couldn't inflict pain. They cared less about keeping their daughters safe apparently.

"She's in a bad way, Lo," Aunt Pris says anxiously, clasping her hands in front of her. "They say it's a stroke."

"A stroke?" I ask. My mother had me when she was seventeen and is barely forty-two years old.

"It's not unheard of," Aunt Pris says. "Unless . . . you don't have anything to do with this, do you?"

"What?" For a moment I'm completely at a loss. Clueless. "Me? What do you mean?"

Aunt Pris licks her lips and considers me with careful speculation.

"Well, I know MiMi taught you things," she says, then rushes to clean it up. "Not that I'm accusing you of doing this. I just wondered if, considering how young she is, this might be some black magic. If it might be a root, a spell, something you could maybe break?"

God, I'm such a fool.

Here I thought Aunt Pris wanted me to come make some kind of peace—to see Mama before she passes on—but she believes I can save her.

I swallow my anger, my resentment, and decide to play along.

"I'm not sure what I can do," I say with appropriate solemnity. "I need to see what we're dealing with here."

Aunt Priscilla's eyes brighten and she nods eagerly. "Yes. See what we're dealing with. It could be anybody behind the spell. You know she's got a . . . a mess of wives who hate her— husbands, too, truth be told. Is there anything I can do to help? Anything you need?"

"Yes." I frown, pretending to think long and hard. "Go to the house."

"Uh-huh," she says, nodding.

"And bring to me . . ."

"Yes, what do you need?" she asks, breathless with hope.

"A piece of her jewelry," I finish, meeting her eyes for a second and then looking away.

"Jewelry?" Aunt Pris's brows draw together. "Just any jewelry?"

"Something she loves preferably and would want to take on her . . . her journey."

"To the afterlife?" Aunt Pris whispers, blinking back tears.

I feel bad for a moment, but that passes. If I'm to have any kind of time alone with my mother, Aunt Pris has to go.

"If it comes to that, yeah," I say in a rush before my guilt stops me. "But I may be able to use that before it does."

"It won't take long." She heads toward the door, pauses, and looks back at me. "Thank you for coming. I didn't think you would."

"Neither did I," I mumble. "You better go on so you can get back with the jewelry."

I haven't allowed myself to look at my mother lying prone in the hospital bed, not really. Once Aunt Pris is gone, I do.

I've seen her twice in thirteen years, both times when death was near. Once at Ron's gravesite, and the other at MiMi's. And the last word she ever spoke to me was goodbye. Now, when it feels like the only thing that will make this right is her words, she can't speak. The beep of the machines, the only sound in the room, may be the bell tolling. Death may be with us again.

If Aunt Pris looks like Iris's sister, my mother looks like Aunt Pris's aunt. Yet, Mama is the younger. Life has been harder on her, or maybe she just never figured out how to shed the years like Aunt Pris did. We look more alike than I realized. I get the tilt of my eyes from her, the shape of my mouth. People used to say I looked like her, and she would tilt her head, studying me like I was a stranger and say, "Really? I don't see it."

"How do you think that made me feel, Mama?" I ask the silent woman. "You didn't want to look like me. You didn't want to see the resemblance, but there is one."

A bitter twist masquerades as a grin on my mouth. "I work in fashion now, and I wear beautiful clothes, and sometimes people actually want to take pictures of *me* and hang them in galleries because they think I'm pretty. You never saw that, though, did you?" I ask her. "Is that why you did it? Is that why you chose him over me? I wasn't light enough. Pretty enough. Did you always wish you could send me back, and first chance you got, you did?"

Tears flood my throat, floating the inevitable question to my tongue.

"Why did you let him hurt me, Mama?"

I sniff, impatient with my own tears. "Why did you choose him, knowing he was rotten? Knowing he had hurt your baby girl? Why didn't you ever come for me?"

The question is harsh and raw in the sterility of the hospital room. "Did you never miss me? Did you ever go back to that day and reconsider giving me away?"

The line of futile questions stacks up around me, going nowhere, bouncing off the walls. Aunt Pris will be back soon with whatever jewelry she thinks I can use in a spell to save my mother.

I didn't come here to save May DuPree.

I came to save myself.

Maybe not "once and for all," because trauma doesn't work that way. There may not ever be a "for all" to my healing. It may always be that the smell of pressed hair sets me off. There may always be days here and there when I can't shake the sadness, the uncertainty that comes from being abandoned and betrayed. I may see trace amounts of this in my life forever, like a bloodstain on the floor that shows pale pink, but is never again spotless.

Oh, the blood of Jesus that washed us white as snow.

The line from one of MiMi's hymns we used to sing on Sundays when no church would have us rises up to meet my pain. *She* rises up to meet my pain, like she always did. Head on. Fearlessly. With wisdom. Compassion. Unconditional love. The things she taught me got me this far. She was the first to lay bandages on my wounds. Today, I close them.

"I thought I needed your words, Mama," I say, my voice hushed. "But my friend says the words that help me more may be the ones I say to *you*, so here goes."

I reach in my purse for the journal I used to write the trauma narrative Marsha guided me through. The last page I flip to is where I begin.

"You had your chance," I read the first line in a strong voice that doesn't waver. "You had your chance to love me unconditionally, but you chose to change me. You had your chance to protect me as a mother should, but you chose to betray me for the man who split me in two. I was a little girl before Ron raped me, and after that day, I knew things I shouldn't know. Had questions it wasn't time for me to ask. He stole my innocence."

The panic batters me in waves, but I draw air into my lungs by little sips at a time until I can take deep breaths. Like it has so many times before, this pain tries to drown me.

"He stole my innocence," I pick up where I left off, my voice trembling and fainter, but still loud enough for me to hear—for her to hear if she can. "And instead of punishing him, instead of seeking justice for me, you chose him. And I've asked why almost every day since. Oh, I may not have said it aloud, but every time I doubted myself, thought I wasn't pretty enough, light enough, needed to be different, needed to be more, I was asking why you did it. Trying to get to the bottom of what was so wrong with me."

My spine straightens and I push against the weight of old pain and faded

nightmares. I square my shoulders, finding the strength to toss them off like a cloak. "But you know what?" I ask rhetorically, because I already know the answer. "There ain't a damn thing wrong with me. The problem was with you. The sin was his, and the shame, the guilt, the dirt I carried around for years, that was his, too. That was yours, and I refuse to keep it."

I shake my head, tears streaming over my cheeks, into the corners of my mouth, collecting at the base of my throat.

"The only good thing you ever did for me was give me away," I say, stroking my *gris-gris* ring. "I didn't come here to see my mother before she died, because my mother is already gone. MiMi was the best mother I could have asked for. Anything good about me finds its way back to her, and anything that's not, she taught me how to accept or change."

I fold the letter because I've memorized the last line. It is the truth that I came into this room knowing, and I'll leave this room having said my piece.

"I came here not to blame you for giving me to her," I tell May DuPree, "but to thank you for giving her to me."

The hospital room door opens, and Aunt Pris rushes in with a jewelry box.

"I just brought the whole thing," she says, handing it to me. "In case you get a . . . a vibe from one piece instead of another."

"A vibe?" I ask, lifting one brow.

"I don't know." She shrugs elegant shoulders. "Whatever you and MiMi do, just do it. Just save her."

"I can't." I shake my head and pass the box back. "I don't know how to save anyone."

"No, you can." She clutches my hands between hers, desperation making her grip painful. "You have to. MiMi said you were the strongest."

"What? When?"

"Always," Aunt Pris says impatiently. "Even when you were a little girl, five, six years old, she said you were the strongest of us all. She said all the power we didn't want passed on to you."

"What? I . . ." I falter and process that. "Well, I can't save a dying woman."

"You have to," Aunt Pris says, tears turning her dark eyes even more luminous. "They say she may not have much time."

And like her words were an invitation, death comes. It's not some cloaked figure that only I see holding a scythe. Not a dark angel or a creature

with horns and a tail. It's the sudden cold and the goosebumps that spring up on my arms.

MiMi said we miss most of what's happening in the world because we can't see it—that we miss the important things relying only on the evidence of our eyes.

Like when death enters the room.

"I can't save her," I tell Aunt Pris. "But there's one thing I can do for her."

"What?" Fear twists her ever-pretty face. "Anything. What can you do?"

I take Aunt Pris's hand, grasping it tightly, and look to my mother dying right in front of me.

"You know who I am," I say, my voice, in spite of the bold words, shaky. "I'm here to make my judgment known."

"What are you doing?" Aunt Pris tugs on her hand, but I don't let go. "I don't want to be part of no spell. What is this?"

"It's the power of an unbroken line," I tell her, keeping my voice calm since her fear is evident. "Two women from our lineage have more power than one."

She stops pulling her hand away. "And we can save her?"

"No, but I think we can help her along the way."

"No." Tears spill over her smooth cheeks. "She can't . . . you have to . . . "

I slowly shake my head, grip her hand more firmly, and turn back to the bed.

"You know who I am," I say again. "I'm here to make my judgment known. This woman's soul hangs in the balance."

I replay all the things I read to Mama, all the things she never said to me, all the questions I'll never have answers for. Even if she could answer me, it wouldn't be enough.

I remember all the pain her actions caused me. I live with the legacy of it still.

I honestly don't know if I have any influence over this woman's afterlife. She's practically a stranger to me. So maybe this is just a show for my aunt to ease her coming grief. Maybe in death, I'm giving May DuPree something she never had in life. Or maybe this is a selfish act, and the words I whisper are not for her in the afterlife, but for me in this one.

"I lay a stone on the side of . . . "

I hesitate over the final word like it really will reverberate in eternity, and

then I drop it like a stone in water whose ripples are infinite. "Peace."

I really want to reach my destination before the sun goes down. These backroads and swamps are creepy as fuck. Any minute now, I fully expect Google maps to say, "*Really, dude?*"

If it fails, I also have the directions Iris sent me. She said the last few miles can get tricky.

"Tricky?" I ask aloud, even though I'm the only one in the rental car. "Feels more like Middle Earth than Louisiana."

The closer I get to MiMi's house, or I guess it actually belongs to Iris and Lotus now, the more uncertain I feel. It's not the backwoods, or the alligators, or the trees that seem animated with arms reaching for me as I drive by. I'm uncertain because I don't know what state I'll find Lotus in. No one's heard from her. The last time we spoke, she was heading to New Orleans to visit her mother in the hospital. I was in China, wishing like hell I was back in the States and could go with her. "And you'll always come for me, won't you?" she asks, a smile in her voice.

"Yes," I promise. "Always.
