Seth's eyes twinkle with laughter. "Drunk Parker is a sight to behold."

"Um, excuse me, I think I was only ever drunk once in your presence."

"Once was enough." He clears his throat. "And it was twice, actually."

Just when I thought we were making progress.

"If today is going to hold any possibility of fun, it might be better not to mention that whole situation." I direct the words at the bars and clubs we're currently driving by, half hoping he won't hear them.

"You're probably right about that."

I whip my head around to face him. "I'm sorry, did you just say I'm right?"

That familiar smirk tugs on the corner of his lips. "Just this once, this one time, on this one occasion, you might be right."

"What's that you said? Lana is always right? Weird, I totally agree! Look at us agreeing and getting along!"

He laughs, for real, causing his shoulders to move even farther into my space.

I can't seem to make myself shift away.

We fill the next half hour with innocuous conversation. Seth asks questions about my experiences at some of the places we pass. I fill him in with stories about the city and May and our coworkers.

"Fuck yes."

Even though I've had plenty of sightings by now, seeing the rich and famous out in the wild still gives me a little thrill every time.

We eat a bit of everything and indulge in some local beers and wines, avoiding heavy topics and heavy looks and any hint of physical contact. I force Seth to buy one of those "I LA" shirts, telling him it's a rite of passage even though no one else I know has one. He humors me and even poses for a photo in it in front of the old-school trolley that circles the area.

The earlier tension has dissipated, due to either the alcohol or the extended time spent in each other's company, and I'm finally able to relax and actually enjoy being with Seth.

I wait until we both have a couple drinks in us before I attempt to dig in a little deeper. As soon as we sat down, Seth spun his hat around backward, leaving his eyes unguarded and looking so much like his high school self I almost choked on my drink.

"How are your parents doing?" If I were completely sober, I know it would hurt to even ask. Not because of the question itself, but because I hate not already knowing the answer. Seth's parents were the closest thing to a functioning family I ever had, and the loss of them in my life still hurts every time I think about it.

Seth pulls the cardboard coaster from under his beer and spins it a few times. "Good. Really good, actually. They both retired three years ago. Now they're just busy living their best lives." He visibly softens the moment he starts talking about his favorite people. Seth and his family were always close in a TV-sitcom kind of way, their connection and love completely genuine and not codependent or weird. "Lizzie got married a few years ago and just had her second kid, so they help her out with childcare a couple days a week."

I knew some of this from my occasional Instagram stalking, but I smile and nod as if this is all new information, all the while trying not to think about my life's alternate timeline. The one where I was invited to the retirement party and planned Lizzie's baby shower. The one where my ovaries squeezed every time I saw Seth holding one of his nieces. My laugh is forced and fake. I go in for another sip of margarita, but the tequila is sour in my mouth. "That's definitely not it. We just barely got back to being friends."

They all give me an *Oh, sweetie* smile, even May.

And I get it. I'm sure it's easy for an outsider to misinterpret Seth's actions. But I know him better than anyone, and Seth Carson is not jealous. Jealousy implies feelings. And feelings are things we can't have for each other. Not anymore.

- 5. While *Just My Type* is told from Lana's POV, Seth also undergoes a major transformation of his own. How did you see Seth change over the course of the story? Do you think any particular challenges or circumstances impacted him more than others?
- 6. Lana surrounds herself with supportive friends, including May, Tessa, and Corey. What role do Lana's friends and coworkers play in the story? Did you have a favorite?

- 7. Talk about Lana's relationship with Natasha. Why have they always been so close? How do you think Lana handles Natasha's growing interference in her professional and her personal life?
- 8. Do you agree or disagree with Seth's original decision to break up with Lana when they were kids? Do you think Lana and Seth have learned from their past mistakes? Why or why not?
- 9. Although it's part of the competition, Lana's list of tasks also works as a way for her to rediscover herself. If you had to make a similar list, what are some things you would include? How would you go about completing them?
- 10. What do you think is next for Lana and Seth?
