Eli pulled her to a stop in a quiet corner of the fair, wrapping his arms around her waist. “Have I told you how much I love you today?”

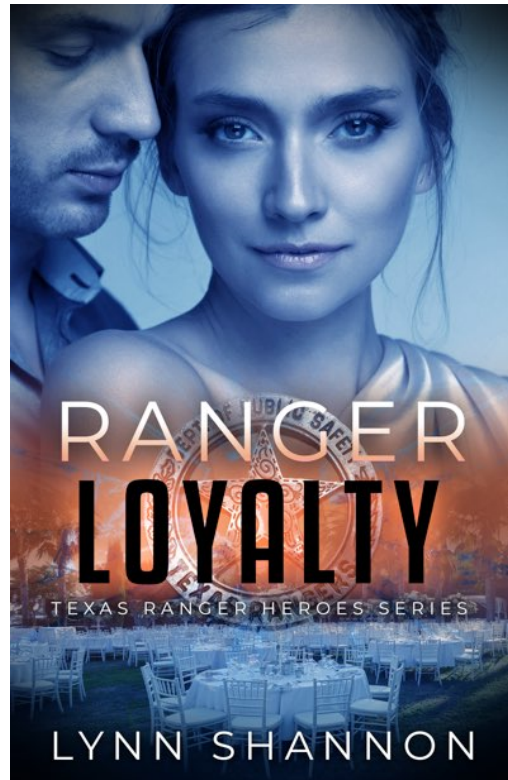
“You have, but I never get tired of hearing it.”
