She smiled, loving when her protective hero was sweet. She pressed her lips to his temple. She knew whatever life held for them, it would be bright.

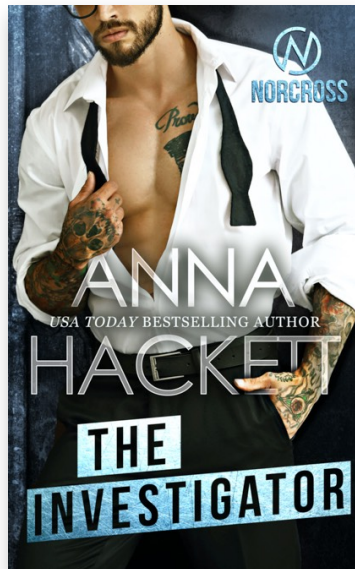

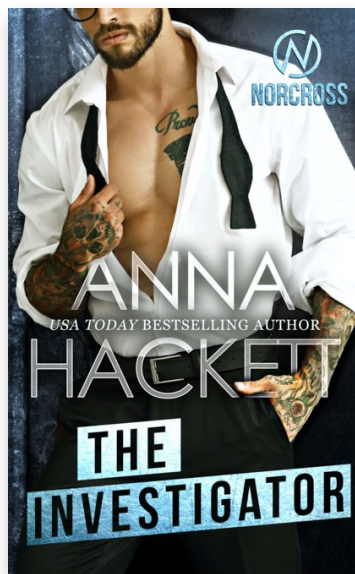
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PREVIEW: THE INVESTIGATOR
