

I love you. Proud of you. We'll do dinner soon." I smile, but it's weak, partly because he's leaving when I already feel like I never see him, and partly because a rock has taken root in my gut.

"Love you too." He backs up, a new customer coming up behind him as he does, but he pauses.

"She'd be proud, Lol," he says, tipping his head to the smiling photo of my mother I have behind the counter, the namesake of the bakery.

I smile a weak, watery smile,

"Go, before I cry and someone gets a photo." He returns the smile, winking as he walks out, putting the phone to his ear.

The rest of the day goes smoothly, with a near constant stream of customers and baking. It's a dream, really, though I might need to look into hiring someone, even if it's just for a few hours a day. Some uninterrupted time to bake or, you know, pee would be nice.

I fully intended to take a tray of items next door as a peace treaty and attempt to make a better first impression, but the time just never came with opening day here, and now that the bakery is closed, my bones ache with exhaustion.

I'm finishing up closing down when my phone rings in my apron pocket, the bluetooth headphones in my ears allowing me to answer as I finish mopping.

"Hey, big-time business owner," Lilah answers. There's a lilt to my baby sister's voice that's always there—sunshine and honey and pure happiness.

Untouched by the chaos.

The baby.

"Lilah!"

"Stop it! No!" The panic creeps through my veins as I pause my mopping. What is wrong? Is she in danger?

"Lilah! What is going on?" My heart is in my stomach.

"My cat is hunting me," she says, and both relief and annoyance flood me.

Her stupid fucking bitch of a cat.

"Jesus, Lilah. You scared the shit out of me."

"Well, she's scaring the shit out of *me*."

"The cat is a menace. She's always hunting you."

"She looks angrier today." I roll my eyes, rinsing out the mop and pushing the bucket to the supply closet.

"She's always angry."

"Angrier, Lola."

"I don't think that's possible." Molly, the calico cat Lilah rescued from a Craigslist ad, hoping to have something cute and cuddly and low maintenance to keep her company, is the meanest cat I've ever met. When she says the cat hunts her, she means it. I've seen her stand on a couch while Molly acts like she's hiding in the savannah grass, ready to pounce. "Have you fed her?" She sighs like I'm an idiot.

"Of course, I've fed my damn cat." The cat is also overweight, and her only joy comes in eating.

And, of course, hunting.

"So what did I do to deserve the pleasure of my baby sister calling me?" I ask, going back to my mopping. I am exhausted, but I'm still running on the fumes of excitement from opening day. It was a complete success, and I even got two catering orders and a cake order for next weekend.

At this rate, I'll be able to pay off the bank loan I had to take out in no time.

"I hear congratulations are in order," she says, her voice singsongy. Lilah is the sweet one, always put together, always amicable. Friendly, the kind of person who you meet and instantly decide she could be your very best friend.

She was that way even when she was a kid, and I always assumed that was why mom was always so careful with her when we were young. She and I would joke that if one of us was going to get kidnapped, it would be Lilah, because she'll talk to any stranger and tell them her life story, for better or worse.

I try to speak, but she keeps going. "I saw the pictures in the *Press*! You looked so cute! The article says it was a huge success."

I roll my eyes and can't fight a smile.

"Thank you. It was . . . pretty awesome."

"I so wish I could have been there, but I have stupid work." There's an audible pout in her voice. "I'll head down soon, though, and eat you out of everything!" Lilah works up north as a pharmaceutical rep, going from doctor's office to doctor's office, using her charm and striking looks to help pay for fancy shoes and exciting outings with friends.

"Of course! You're welcome any time. You can stay with me in my new apartment!"

"We'll have to sneak me into town though. Dad keeps trying to set me up on dates with his friends' sons. I'm like, do I *look* like I'd make a good politician's wife? Ugh." I can almost hear the eye roll and head shake she'd make, her dark-blonde hair in a perfect blowout swaying from side to side. While I got Dad's Irish heritage, red-tinged hair and fair skin, Lilah looks like mom, a short, curvy thing with long blonde hair and skin that tans perfectly.

I hated her for that for a time, the fact that I got the ass and none of the boobs. Be good!" before there's the slamming of the door and the beeping of a car fob coming through the line. "Alright, sis, I gotta go. I love you! I'll come visit soon, yeah? Shoot me a text. I'm so proud of you, babe."

"Will do. Love you!" I say and then stand in the bakery all alone, staring at the wall as the phone goes dead.

### FIVE

#### -Lola-

EVERY BONE, muscle, and tendon aches with exhaustion, but I'm wide awake.

After a day of baking, handling the press, and doing interview after interview, smiling next to my father without grimacing at the fact that he only said a handful of words to me (all carefully chosen and within the earshot of reporters), then a full day of running my own business and cleaning said bakery and prepping for day two, every single atom of my body is tired.

But day one is done.

New Lola is here, and we're starting with an exciting clean slate.

While I've been in and out of the bakery for the last month, making it my own and perfecting everything, the lease for the apartment above it didn't start until yesterday, meaning the day before my new bakery opened, I was moving things from Sam's place, where I was staying between apartments since he's rarely ever there, and the storage facility I had rented to my new home.

I had to drag everything down the three flights of stairs at his place, into a box truck I had rented, and then back up the narrow steps separating my space from my neighbor's. Sam offered to help, but with how busy he is, I didn't want to bother him. So it was just me and my not very present muscles lugging boxes until I wanted to collapse.

Then I ran out to the distribution center to get the hundreds of pounds of flour, sugars, butter, eggs, and whatever else I would need to feed the sweet tooth of the Ocean View boardwalk.

And as I lay in my bed (that I had to painstakingly push up the stairs and

then assemble), everything hurts. Exhaustion weighs me down like one of those weighted blankets.

I think moving my toes would be an impossibility.

But despite the whole body exhaustion, and the knowledge that I have to wake up bright and early to get baking, I can't sleep.

Not because I'm overthinking every moment that brought me here.

Not because I'm panicking that day two will be a flop.

Not because I'm terrified that I won't be able to live up to the expectations laid upon me, both by my family and myself.

These things are true, but they aren't the source of my insomnia.

Instead, it's the bass of Cake's "Shadow Stabbing" pounding through the walls of my new apartment, which I'm learning at this moment, are incredibly thin.

Don't get me wrong—it's a great song. In fact, I even have it on my "Shitty Day" playlist, which I play to get myself out of a funk.

But when it's midnight on a Friday and I need to be up at five, it becomes even less appealing.

Panic floods me.

I think I may have made a *huge* mistake.

When I saw the ad in the paper, I barely questioned a thing. The advertisement stated that a commercial kitchen and storefront were up for lease with a small one-bedroom apartment above it. I called up the owners, came to see it, and put the deposit on the lease all in the same day.

They advertised the location as a "bakery on the quiet end of the Ocean View boardwalk," and when I came here to tour the space, it was just that. It's on the far end of the boardwalk, nearing the homes valued at millions of dollars each and far away from the bars and amusements that draw the rowdier crowds.

It was *perfect*.

When I found this location in the paper just days after that wake-up call, I saw it as a sign that this was the direction I needed to go.

In some ways, I saw it as a push from my mother that it was time. That I had done my duty and I could live for *me*.

I'd been quietly planning for a storefront for years, scrimping and saving the money, telling no one about my dream. *Mom's dream*. It had been a donut shop in a past life, but when the other half of the donut shop couple left, the remaining owner closed the business and stayed in the apartment while figuring out what to do next—hence the apartment lease not opening until *last night*.

While last night went fine, despite my inability to fall asleep in a strange place, it seems I never had the chance to find out the neighbor is loud.

And when I say loud, I mean when I went to make myself a glass of chamomile tea an hour ago, my dishware was rattling against itself in the cabinets.

That kind of loud. The kind of loud you can feel in your bones.

After a long day, I was hoping to go to bed early, get rested for another early morning. Except this noise is fucking with that plan.

The noise started at eight. At eight, I was fine with it—it's about what I expected, moving in next to a tattoo shop on the boardwalk. And considering I woke my neighbor up early with my own work schedule, I figured fair was fair. We'd eventually figure out a schedule that worked for both of us. Tomorrow, I'd come over and deliver some treats and have an adult conversation.

But now it's four hours later and the muffled sound of alternative rock is shaking in my brain.

When I signed the lease, I knew getting a place on the Ocean View boardwalk would be loud, especially during the warm months. Sure, I thought situating myself on the quieter end would be better, but I never came into this thinking I'd have a sound, silent sleep every night.

In fact, for the first two hours I told myself this was just training for

what's to come when the real summer crowds hit.

At ten, I got ready for bed and realized the sound wasn't dulling anytime soon. I washed my face, did my grounding routine of skin care and teeth brushing, and put on my lucky pajamas—the silky nightie Lilah got me for my birthday last year. She spent way too much, but it's one of my favorite luxuries. I wore it the night I put in my application for the bakery and woke up the next morning to a voicemail telling me I got it.

I secretly think it's lucky—and I could use some luck right now.

Once that was all done, I lay down.

And I stared at the ceiling.

And tried to block out the music.

But still, it's unnerving settling to sleep in a new place that isn't completely yours yet. You don't know the strange shadows, the way the wind creaks the walls. Each time I glance at a clock, I do the math for how many hours of sleep I'll get if I fall asleep at that moment. It's a habit—a bad one.

Why do we do that? Why do we count down the damage instead of making a change?

For me, I've spent the entirety of my thirty years avoiding confrontation. I'm a fixer, not a problem maker. For as long as I can remember, even when I was too young to be relied on as such, friends and family have come to me for help.

I've never stopped any of them, always doing whatever it took to make life easier for them, even if it meant a sacrifice on my end. I hate to be a pain, a nuisance.

This trait is what I'm warring with at midnight when I start questioning if I should just go over there and kindly ask my neighbor to turn down the music.

*I can't*, I think. *That would be rude*.

This morning was unbearably embarrassing. We already got off on the wrong foot, but I signed this lease for five years, and I can only assume my

neighbor has a handful of years left on his lease as well. I want him to like me, especially since I plan to be here for a long time, and I know the tattoo shop is well loved in the community.

But also because I've learned that you can avoid so many issues in shitty housing situations if you befriend your neighbors.

Regardless of my commitment to not start drama, I can't sleep.

This has to be God's version of payback for being so loud this morning. I swear it. And I swear, if I had known that I was being so loud, loud enough to wake him, I definitely would have been more considerate.

New Lola might be committed to taking names and getting shit done, but that doesn't mean she's an inconsiderate bitch.

On the other hand, while I don't want to bug him *again* on my first full day here, there's the chance that if I let this go, it might become a regular thing, and that would be worse.

I war with this for a while, trying to balance the need for sleep with the need to not stir the pot.

I *hate* to stir the pot.

Except, this is my new page. New Lola. When I signed this contract, using the money I saved for the vision I selfishly let myself dream up, I told myself I could only do it if I was doing it for me.

Not to give Lilah a glimpse at what ambition looked like.

Not to pay off debts I didn't earn.

Not to create another marketing tactic for Dad's campaigns.

Not to honor Mom in some obtuse way that doesn't even matter, not in the grand scheme.

But for me. Because when was the last time I really, truly did something *for Lola?* I need to take more initiative. I need to work on change over acceptance.

And maybe even more, I need to work on not being such a damn pushover, letting everyone get their way at my expense. I proved I meant business on *that* aspect of personal growth when I went through the lease for the building. The owners wanted a ten-year lease—I demanded five. They told me I'd need to pay extra for the ovens and equipment already here. I refused and told them I wanted to get the place outfitted with extra ovens. I demanded an extra parking spot out back for an employee when I hire one and even managed to get a decreased leasing rate for the first six months.

I'm pretty damn proud of myself for *that* one.

I don't know why the fact that I can negotiate and demand what I need to shocks me, but it did.

It shouldn't.

Ever since our mom died when I was 15 and Lilah was 10, I've had to fill that space.

I was the one who remembered permission slips that needed signing and homework that needed checking.

I was the one who called the utilities and negotiated lower rates or extensions on bills, despite coming from assumed wealth.

I was the one who made sure things were kept quiet and under wraps, kept within the family.

I was also the one who made sure Lilah stayed safe.

I sigh, realizing the difference that I ignored.

All of those things protected the people I love. *Not me*. Advocating for things my family needed, that part was easy.

Advocating for myself?

That's apparently a lot more difficult.

I'm stewing on this thought, the realization uncomfortable, when the music stops for a blissful moment.

Aching muscles I hadn't realized I was tensing loosen, and I sigh in relief. Sleep should come easy now.

And then the track changes, and the music starts back up.

"Noooo," I groan out loud, reaching for a pillow to lay over my head.

It drowns nothing out.

In fact, I think all it does is keep in the negative thoughts and memories. Like being stuck under the pillow with them is giving them the gas they need to grow.

Memories I keep hidden.

Emotions and feelings I don't let out. Ever.

I'm a *new person*. I don't need to address these.

But stuck here, unable to sleep, my thoughts my only companion?

Yeah. They're lashing out to wreak havoc.

I need to do something.

Rolling off my bed, I sit on the edge and look toward the door, trying to decide what to do.

The thought of going over there, talking to complete strangers who I'll be stuck working and living next to for at least a few years, puts me into utter

panic.

A deep laugh breaks out over the music, and a mix of panic and guilt overtakes me.

They sound like they're having fun.

Do I want to be the person who ruins that? The voice in my head telling me if I do that everyone will hate me gets louder.

But then New Lola comes out and smacks that voice straight across her face, sending her spiraling into oblivion.

Don't you deserve a good night's sleep? Why should their fun come above your own comfort? New Lola, remember?

New me is right.

People pleasing is so yesterday.

I stand up, slipping my feet into a pair of slide sandals, and walk to the door, ready to go. I am going to go next door. Politely ask them to keep it down. I'll be nice about it. I'll . . .

Then the thought of knocking on the door guts me, and I'm back at square one, the square where I'm wondering just how much sleep do I *actually* even need to run a bakery, ya know? They'll probably be done by . . . oh . . . two?

I turn back around.

But New Lola smacks me again.

I head to my kitchen counter and grab the paper box holding cookies I brought up to celebrate my first day, but then I became so overwhelmed with exhaustion I skipped it entirely.

There. That's a good peace offering, right? A good neighborly hello?

*Fuck*. Or does it seem like I'm trying to bribe them to be quiet?

*Oh God, get over yourself!* inner me yells, and that does it. It pushes me to grab the box off the counter and walk to the front door, opening it up and propping it on a moving box I need to unpack.

That's when I realize the noise isn't coming from the apartment next door.

No, it's so loud, yet it's coming from the *tattoo* shop, traveling up and over into my new home.

And now that the sound buffer that is my door is gone, I can hear it's not just two or three people having fun.

It's an entire party.

Jesus Christ.

New Lola shrivels at the task in front of her.

So does Old Lola.

Standing up to one person who you've already technically met, despite it being an embarrassing catastrophe, is one thing.

Interrupting what sounds like an entire party? That's another.

Shit.

I slowly walk down the stairs separating the buildings, trying to get the nerve until I'm at the entryway between them. There are three doors there—the back entrance that leads to the street, an entrance to the bakery, and a door that leads to Coleman Ink next door.

I lift my hand to knock on the tattoo shop but freeze. Panicking.

Maybe I'll let it go another twenty minutes, an hour. I mean, how long could it be? I bet it's settling down and—

A loud, jarring round of laughter interrupts me, and I head back to the door, reinvigorated.

I lift my hand and . . .

Nothing.

I can't do it.

Shit.

What am I doing? I'm standing here ready to, what? Interrupt a party? Be that neighbor?

I can't do it.

Fuck.

But also, I can't not sleep.

It's then I decide.

I can't do this forever, pacing in a hall like a crazy person, mumbling to myself, trying to get the nerve to ask a party to keep it down.

I need to go talk to them.

This can be another version of day one. The first day of the rest of my life, where I refuse to let my concern for making others feel uncomfortable mess with how I live my life.

I'm just as important.

*It's crazy that I feel the need to remind myself that.* 

I lift my hand to knock, to bang on the door, and I feel a breeze.

As my arm lifts, the silk moves too, and I realize I'm still in my nightie.

What is wrong with me?

I need to go upstairs, change, and then bring the cookies around to the *front* of the shop like a normal person. Try to get their attention, kindly ask

them to turn down the music, and start a great friendship.

So what if we started off poorly? We both were taken aback. He probably was tired and cranky, the same way I am right now.

Yes, that's it. I'm sure my new neighbors are perfectly kind and reasonable.

Understanding, even.

Maybe we can create some kind of partnership—get a tattoo and a free cookie!

But first, I need to turn around and put on actual clothes. I start up the stairs, getting up two steps, eager to hide away with my new plan.

Then I hear it. The click of the door.

No, no, no, no!

"You okay?" I hear, my back to the voice, and fuck, fuck, fuck.

I can't believe this is happening to me!

Why does the world fucking *hate me?* 

"Hey, uh, hi," I say the words up the stairs, trying to pretend this isn't happening.

I can feel the cool air from the air conditioning in his shop leaking out through the door and licking up my legs and the underside of my *fucking asscheeks*, which I'm 99% sure are sticking out and now staring straight at this man.

Jesus fucking Christ.

"You okay?" he repeats.

I turn around slowly, holding the cookies like an idiot and trying to stretch a calm smile on my lips.

I think about this, what the future will look like, for the long minutes on the drive back. I don't even notice we've parked out behind our apartments until Ben is standing outside the passenger side door, opening it. I jump in my seat, panic flooding me.

"Hey, hey. It's me. It's just me, sweet girl," he says, his voice running through me to soothe the panic, the ache. I look him over, taking each bit into my mind and savoring each detail.

This man.

He's gorgeous.

He deserves the world.

His hand moves out, grabbing my arm gently and helping me out of the car. Easing me out until my feet are steady on the pavement.

"Do you need me to carry you?" he asks.

"I'm good," is all I say as I move toward the door, trying to keep my wits, trying to keep it together. He unlocks the front door, his hand moving to my waist as we step in, and I look up the stairs.

That's a lot of stairs.

My entire body aches, my fingers in the stretchy wrap feeling numb and the stitches above my eye starting to throb.

I need sleep.

I need a drink.

I need sugar and butter and carbs.

I need to cry.

And at this moment, I don't know what I need first. They all seem pretty vital.

But what I need most of all is Ben to stop being so nice to me, to stop being helpful. I need Ben to close himself behind his door, turn his music on way too loud, and go back to ignoring me.

That sounds easier than having any kind of conversation.

I start up the stairs, his hand on my lower back, ready to catch me.

When we hit the landing, we stand there for a moment before Ben starts for his door, digging in his pocket to unlock it.

That's it, I guess.

Easier than I thought.

My own hand is fingering the bottom of the shirt he had Hattie bring me.

It's my shirt and I can't help but wonder if his coworker also knows how to pick a lock or if he made himself a second spare when he replaced the lock on my door since my bag, and thus, keys, were brought to the hospital with me.

"What are you doing?" I hear before fingers are wrapped around my good wrist.

I don't jolt, though, the feeling familiar and safe.

Ben.

"Going home?"

"What the fuck?" I stare at him, confused. "You're not going in there."

"What?"

"Babe, you were just nearly kidnapped. You got ten stitches in various places and went through an incredibly traumatizing event. Not to mention, we have no idea if Johnny was the end of it. You are not going into that apartment." I sigh.

"You don't have to do this, Ben."

"What are you talking about?"

"Protect me. I'm good now. Johnny's in custody. No one will be coming after me; it would be way too obvious. I didn't do anything at all. Johnny aired out all of his dirty laundry, and even if he somehow gets released, we all know someone else will be taking care of him." A muscle ticks in Ben's jaw.

"You're not leaving my sight for at least two days."

"Excuse me?"

"You left my sight for ten minutes, and you were gone."

"Ben, this is—"

"I was scared, Lola," he says, turning me and starting to press me into my door, his body melding to mine. If you'd have asked me, I would have told you that, given everything that happened, this would scare me.

But it's a comfort.

Protection.

"Ben—"

"Your voice came through the line, and I heard his voice, heard the panic in yours . . . I lost my mind. I've never run that fast. Then I see you, *my girl*, pinned to a car, that fuckwad trying to force you in. Heard when he hit you, heard that it caused you pain, and I swear, Lola, I felt it. True, physical pain knowing I didn't keep you safe, that you were hurt." A hand moves to my






