“Let me know if you need any more help moving boxes,” I lie in a loud voice and gratitude fills her eyes.


“Thank you, I appreciate your help.” She looks down, twisting a silver sea turtle ring on her right ring finger.

“Soulmates, huh? I’d say me getting here at just the right time is more of an indicator for soulmates than guessing my name correctly.”


She leans in and tension crackles like a beach lightning storm between us. “Are you looking for a soulmate, Levi?”

“Levi, you can't say things like that—”


His phone rings, so he pulls it out to silence it. “I have to go, I'm already so late. Try to think about me too much this weekend.”

“Or a really romantic one.”


“Isa,” I warn.

"Did you forget how to play?" Grayson laughs, dragging me out of the painful memory. "You're doing terrible."


Coming back to the present, I see Grayson maneuvering his man to score yet another basket.

Levi: I've got to focus on work now. Have a great day, beautiful.


Dahlia: You too.

“Thank you.” He beams. “You were a worthy opponent.”


I snort, incapable of keeping in my laughter at the way he’s speaking.

"Okay, I'll be right here."


He nods and walks back over to the crowd he was with.

“I don’t know that I can. My life is so different than it used to be.” She sounds far away, as far away as she feels. “Why can’t we just be friends?”


“You and I both know we’ve never been good at just friends, Doll.”

“Why are you asking, is it because you want to kiss me just as bad?” I challenge and she smirks.


“I bet you try to kiss me before the day is up, that’s how *bad* you want to,” she teases, and I chuckle.

“I feel like you’re not telling me the whole truth.”


“If I did, it might be over for real. But I’ll play by your rules, beautiful. Keep ‘em coming.”

"Okay, I'll text you."


"Are you sure you don't want to change any of the rules? Or break one while you have the chance? Once I walk out they begin, you know. So if you want to steal a last minute kiss..."


“Are you ready for your close up?” Maddie suddenly appears in front of me, making me jump.


Her leg presses against mine and I grin before leaning down to whisper in her ear.

“Of Rhodes,” I say at the same time as him.


“And a little bit of Grayson,” he adds, to which I nod in agreement.


instead of less. Maybe it would be better for her for me to bow out and let her find a guy who loves her and is safer.



I nod, then remember he can't see me. "Yes, I remember."



"How about we hang out and eat? All of this emotional stuff is kind of depressing. It's a good day," I say and pull Dahlia into my side.


"As long as you promise to tell us if you need to talk or something is wrong," Maverick says.

I stand up and walk over to my bookshelf, pulling a book off of it. “I think you both would benefit from reading this book about the different love languages.”


Audrey looks intrigued, while Charles looks like he’d rather walk barefoot over Legos.

The video stops playing and it's silent for a moment, before Grayson breaks the tension like only he can.


“Let’s cut the cake so I can eat my feelings,” he says, making everyone laugh, including Dahlia and Jasmine.

It was a subject I knew I wanted to touch. And the way I chose to do that, was to have Dahlia's character become a therapist passionate about helping them and their families.

I know this doesn't represent every single detective, department, or Chief. But I knew it was Levi's story. And maybe it's someone else's too.

I'd say the same about the thread of grief that connects each Carter brother, and this time Dahlia, too. We all walk through this at some point, and my prayer is that if you have or do, that you'll remember grief isn't linear. And it's okay if you need help. Don't be so afraid of the pain of grieving that you miss out on the healing.
