SUMMARY

Thrall is based on the fairy tale Cinderella, the first in a new Dystopian Romance series by the author of Recruitment and The Cure.

In the realm of Kravan, children of lower-class citizens are raised in a prison-like structure called "The Tower" from birth until adulthood. Known as the Tethered, they are held in thrall until their powers reveal themselves around the time of their nineteenth birthday.

Every year, the Tethered who are tested and deemed harmless are chosen to leave the Tower and join the outside world as servants to live in the households of the ruling class. Those who are deemed threats are taken away—and no one knows what happens to them, though they suspect the worst.

Shara has spent her entire life in the Tower, longing for the day she will be chosen to leave. She's always been certain her powers would be minimal just as her mother's allegedly were, and that she would be assigned to a life of simple servitude.

When Shara receives her Placement in the home of a Noble family, she feels at first like she has finally found her place in the world. But over time, mysteries begin to reveal themselves about her Proprietor and those who live in the house...including the handsome fellow Tethered who shares a wing of the house with her.

When he offers her an opportunity to attend the annual Prince's Ball and to see the world of the Nobility for what it truly is, Shara begins to learn the ugly truth about the divisions between the ruling class and the Tethered.

After a life spent in near-isolation, Shara must learn to distinguish friend from foe, and to decide if her new allies are who they claim to be...

Or if they will turn out to be her greatest enemies.

THE SEVEN RULES OF THE REALM OF KRAVAN

1. From their birth inside the Tower, humans with unnatural powers, otherwise known as “Tethered,” are the property of Pureblood Nobles. If deemed worthy at the age of nineteen, they are offered a Placement with the Noble families of Kravan.

2. No Household other than Kravan’s Royal Family shall own more than two Tethered at once.

3. To be a Tethered is to be allowed no physical intimacy whatsoever. There are no exceptions.

4. No Tethered shall marry or produce offspring with another Tethered or a Pureblood. If impregnation occurs, the child will then be born and raised in the Tower.

5. Any Tethered who represents a threat to the Nobility may be killed without trial.

Drukkar is a tall, broad-shouldered Tethered who would probably be considered our cohort’s hottest male commodity...if he wasn’t such a dickhead.

He revels in chaos, and it doesn’t help that his power is the ability to move with blinding speed. Drukk usually shoots around the combat ring like a crazed rat who’s ingested too much caffeine, lunging this way and that so fast that I can scarcely follow him with my eyes, let alone avoid any weapon he hurls my way.

Right now, though, he’s taking pleasure in taunting me. He’s a cat, patiently watching a wounded mouse stagger around, knowing it has no hope of winning an absurdly uneven battle.

He’s standing motionless across the ring, his boorish smile showing off a set of snow-white teeth and a penchant for cruelty.

Determined to do something other than just lie in wait for the next assault, I clasp my blade in my right hand, bringing it up to shoulder height and readying myself to fling it. Like all our training daggers, it’s sharp enough to pierce through Drukk’s uniform and bury itself in his flesh. But it’s unlikely to do any real damage unless my aim is impossibly good—which it never is.

It’s not that I’m uncoordinated. I *should* be able to hit a huge target like Drukkar easily enough.

Standing my ground, convinced that I can somehow find a way to retaliate, I focus on the blade between Drukk's fingers, which will most likely end up lodged deep in some part of me.

"Get it over with, then," I say under my breath. "Throw it."

But to my dismay, Drukk just continues to stand there, his eyes locked on my own.

I've known Drukkar all my life, yet we've never had a lengthy conversation. And we've certainly never spent more than two seconds staring each other down. We've fought before, and not surprisingly, I've lost every

An assertive voice pulls me back to my predicament and to Drukk, who still looks as if he's frozen in time. "His wrist unit is probably bugging out on him," Ore says. "He may be disoriented by a glitch in his M.O.D. It happens sometimes, though it's rare."

"I can beat him!" I whisper-hiss, determined not to look like an utter failure in front of our mysterious visitor.

Here, in the Tower?

I've never seen Tallin's face. None of us has. All we know is he's the second-most powerful man in all of Kravan after his father the king.

I suppose the visitor *could* be royalty. I can't deny he's beautiful enough to be a prince like the ones I've always imagined from story books.

"Shara! Look out!" someone cries, yanking me out of my foolish fantasy.

By the time I pull my eyes to Drukk, I'm already too late. He's regained his composure and—worse—his ability to move with unnatural speed. His eyes fixed on me, he hurls his arm forward and the blade releases, embedding itself a split-second later into my right thigh.

When the pain comes, it's so intense that I can't even bring myself to scream.

Nev’s fingers are on me now, gingerly reaching for my throat, trying to find a pulse as if she’s convinced the blow to my leg was enough to kill me.

“What the hell do you think you’re doing?” Ore shouts. “Do *not* touch her!”

“Drukkar had his hands all over her!” she cries. “What, he’s suddenly allowed to touch her but I’m not?”

“That was different!” Ore growls. “*That* was combat.”

“It’s still against the rules, which is why we have weapons—or have you forgotten that one inconvenient detail?”

She doesn’t need to remind him. We all know the rules, even stubborn-as-shit Ore. The members of our cohort haven’t been allowed physical contact—not even a friendly shove in the exercise yard—for seven years now.

Rule Number Three: To be a Tethered is to be allowed no intimacy whatsoever.

nourishment, and little more.

One day a few years ago as Nev and I ate lunch together, it struck us both that neither of us would ever know what it felt like to kiss someone—not even a friendly peck on the cheek. The realization was like a strange, surreal blow—as if an intangible part of our futures had been ripped away before we’d so much as had a chance to contemplate its significance.

I don’t know if the Nobility is convinced that the young women in the Tower will somehow get pregnant if our hands accidentally brush against a young man’s—and yes, I do know how pregnancy happens. It takes more than an accidental stroke of skin to make a baby.

But I’m not exaggerating when I say the Warden would tolerate us murdering each other before he’d tolerate a kiss.

The penalties for breaking the intimacy rule are strict.

A few years ago, a boy and a girl in our cohort—their names are Cole and Valia—were caught sneaking a kiss in the darkest corner of the mess hall. For that infraction, each of them spent a month in solitary confinement in a Blackroom.

Since then, neither of them has ever once spoken to the other. To this day, I don’t know if it’s because they were ordered to keep their distance, or because they’re too afraid of the consequences of temptation.

However good that kiss was, I’m pretty sure it wasn’t worth a month in solitary. I once spent twelve hours in a Blackroom, and it was the worst, most isolating experience of my life.

I can’t begin to imagine the trauma of an entire month.

“Shara,” Ilias, the third in our little trio of friends says as he crouches down next to Nev. He looks as concerned as she does when his eyes move to the knife still embedded in my thigh. “What the hell were you doing? You should have—”

“She’s fine, like I said,” Ore grunts, pulling up next to him and yanking the blade out, eliciting a cry from my lips. With a smirk and a clap of his hands, he shouts, “Class is over! Back to your Whiterooms, now. Our little Healer can patch herself up on her cot.”

“She won’t be fully healed for hours. Don’t you think a medic should—” Nev starts to say.

“No, I don’t,” Ore interrupts, disdain dripping from his voice. “The domestic goddess will be just fine.”

Domestic goddess.

That's what assholes like Ore and others have called me for years. And it's what Maude hopes I'll be when I leave the Tower and head to my Placement—even though A. I. units aren't *supposed* to want things at all.

My bossy little implanted overlord decided long ago that my best hope in life is to become a Domestic in the employ of some wealthy family or other. She's trained me over the years to dust my cell so thoroughly that not a speck of any foreign substance can be detected in any of its corners.

~Always strive to prove yourself useful, Maude nags regularly. Useful people survive out there, and useless ones don't.

I'm pretty sure her exercise in anal-retentive fastidiousness is simply a tool to help me stave off boredom. There's not much to do in a mostly-empty Whiteroom, after all. Keeping the place spotless gives me a goal each day.

As annoying as Maude is, I'll admit that a part of me is grateful she's forced me to be so disciplined. Tomorrow on our Placement Day, the new Prefect will come to assess our cohort's members—and I, for one, will be ready for him.

Ore told us recently the *former* Prefect—a man who had held the position for the last thirty-some years—died a few months back. A wealthy Noble was named to take his place, and he—or she—will observe us, then decide who among us is worthy of the most desirable Placements.

Short of a miracle, I'll end up exactly where Maude, Ore, and my Tethered peers have always predicted I'd be: a mousy servant to some semi-wealthy family.

THE TOWER ISN'T A PRISON, or so we're told.

In his measured, authoritative voice, Warden Kurtz has assured us for years that the Tower is a “safe space” for our kind. He says we're not so much locked in as protected from ourselves.

“The Tower is a place where you Tethered can be raised without risk to yourselves or others, and where you grow up learning valuable skills such as obedience to your future masters and mistresses,” he tells us. “There was a time not so long ago when the former Prefect considered killing every Tethered as they came into this world. It is the kindness of the Nobles that keeps you alive. It's mercy that gives each of you the chance at a life and a future. Never forget, you're here because you live in thrall to the Nobility.”

Thrall.

When I was eight and heard that word for the first time, I asked Nev what it meant. She told me that to be in thrall was to be under someone else's power—it meant you worshiped them.

“Enthralled,” she said, “means you admire something or *someone* so much you almost melt in their presence. It's like what we feel for the Nobility—the admiration for their wealth and power.”

“But it's not the Nobles who have power,” I protested, confused. “The Tethered are way stronger. The Nobility are just wealthy Normals, aren't they?”

That statement was met with a stern warning from Maude and a threat that if I ever spoke disparagingly of the Nobility again, I would be sent to a Blackroom to languish in its depths for weeks on end.

Nev told me to listen to Maude, so I shut my mouth and never brought it

up again.

A few years after we had that conversation, I came upon a dictionary in the cohort's library. On a whim, I looked up "thrall" and saw that one possible definition involved indentured servitude. "A slave, servant, or captive," it said.

To this day, I'm not sure which definition is accurate—but I know well enough now to keep my questions to myself.

Every single person who is born in the Tower has at least one Tethered parent—which is the polite way of saying one of our parents has "unnatural" powers.

It's why we've been raised in here, with the Warden and our Maude units watching us like we're carefully monitored livestock. It's also why we're not allowed to leave the Tower until we turn nineteen and our powers—or lack thereof—reveal themselves.

The Tower's interior—at least, the little I've seen of it—is a consistent, glossy white, its walls illuminated by some internal source. Its floors, ceiling, and walls all appear to be made of some polished lacquer, its corners slightly curved to facilitate cleaning.

The only parts of the Tower I've ever seen that aren't bright white are the Blackrooms. As their name dictates, their walls are onyx black, their doors windowless so that when they're sealed shut, there's not so much as a hint of light within their confines.

Warden Kurtz once told us the Rebellion began because a group of armed Tethered miscreants grew angry that the Nobility held so much power.

The so-called "History" books speak mostly of the time after the war, about the Nobility's kindness and mercy toward the cruel Tethered, and in particular, the benevolence of Kravan's Royal Family.

The texts explain in specific detail why Kravan's hierarchy works best when wealthy families sit at the top and others serve them—and why we Tethered need to be kept in check.

Our incarceration, according to those who wrote the history books, is for the best for the Tethered—because we have a habit of turning cruel for no reason.

It's not that I mind the sight of blood—I'm more familiar with open wounds than anyone in our cohort.

It's that the rebels look so...*pathetic*. They look dirty and hungry and poor, and I can't help thinking they're simply trying to survive.

No Tethered in the Tower has ever been hungry. None of us has any need of money. As for dirty—there's not much chance to get filthy when you live in a white-walled home, and you're not allowed outside.

It's a shock to your system. But it's only about twenty minutes to our destination, and you'll be okay—I promise. Your new home is beautiful, and I'm sure you'll love it."

Her words are a kindness, and I appreciate them. Even so, my mind is still twisting itself around, trying to figure out why we were never told more about what lies on the outside of the Tower. Why Kravan's Capitol was made to sound like a land of opportunity where Nobles and Normals mixed and mingled.

Or maybe no one ever *actually* told us that.

The fictional books we were allowed to read spoke of houses with pretty gardens, happy children, and dogs and cats living in harmony.

But I realize as I stare out the Hoverer's large side window that I've never read a description of the Capitol itself. Here and there, I scanned paragraphs

about Normals and their lives spent working and tending to their homes. I suppose I simply drew the conclusion that the Normals lived in the lovely little homes from my imagination.

Warden Kurtz used to read us fairy tales when we were little. When we turned twelve, he stopped reading them and issued us a stern warning.

“In those stories,” he said, “the girl often falls in love with the handsome prince. They get married and live happily ever after. They left us with nothing to lose.

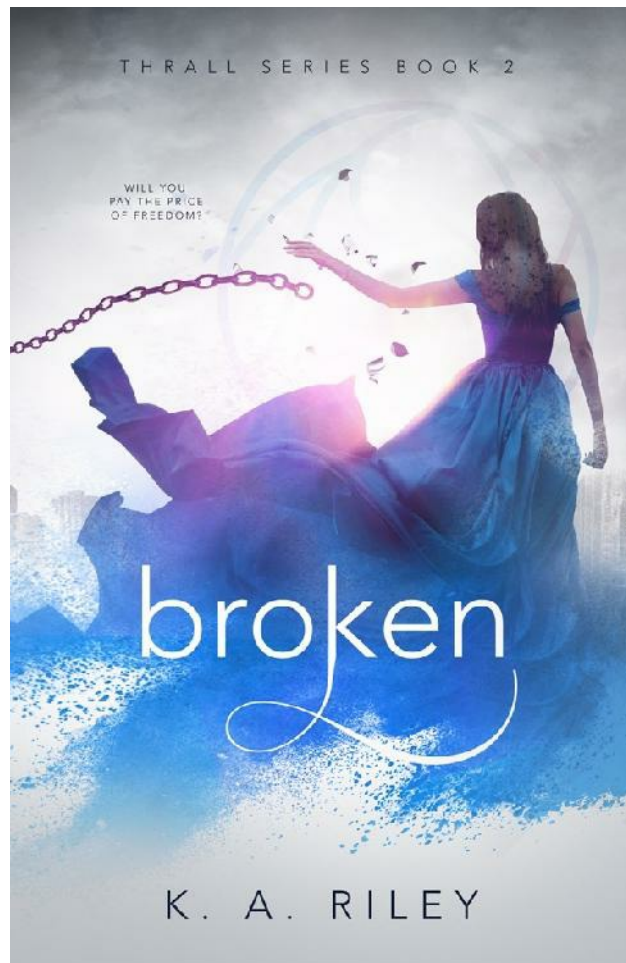
And when it's all over—when Thorne and I are safe—when we find a way to take down the king, the prince, and every other hypocritical Noble standing in our way...
